



HISTORICAL INFO

In the cold winters of northern Europe, houses were difficult to heat. Box like wooden beds, built almost like a closet, where meant to hide from the cold of the night, when the last chills of the family fire went out. Just not too cozy if you were claustrophobic.

The box bed, which originated in the late medieval period, appeared in different forms throughout Europe: there are examples from Britain, Scotland, Austria, the Netherlands and Scandinavia. In some places they were used until the 20th century, which makes sense when you consider the cold European winters and houses where the warmth came only from a wood fire. Even before electricity, people simply didn't heat their homes that much, so being cold outside also meant being cold inside.

Carl's Story—in his own words...


"I was raised in the Northwoods and liked to hunt, fish and trap as much as any young outdoorsman. Because of my crippled foot, I couldn't keep up with my pals on treks through the snow.

I fooled around with a Model T Ford and adapted it to skis, but it was too cumbersome for the woods and unworkable in our deep snows or unplowed roads.

In those days a lot of would-be inventors were trying to devise a powered snow vehicle. My brother-in-law worked on a machine he thought could get its locomotion from a wind propeller. In the winter of 1924 I began work on my "Motor Toboggan". In my mind this would be the most practical means of travel over the snow. The endless cleated track, slide rails and liquid-cooled power unit would prove to set a standard for the future. My machine would be granted a patent in 1927. With this machine, I was able to turn the tables on my hunting comrades—as long as there was snow on the ground. While they hoofed it on foot, I would ride and get to our destination in the woods an hour ahead of them!"

For 31 inventive years Eliason and Eliason/Four Wheel Drive (FWD) snowmobiles were the lone lifeline of snowmobiling. Modern snowmobiles are directly traceable to the original hand built 1924 Carl Eliason machine.

Today, at Sayner, Wisconsin, the Vilas County Historical Society Museum has on display the original snowmobile that took two winters for Carl to create. The museum also displays one of every "Motor Toboggan" model built by Eliason/FWD. The newest is the 1953 vintage Eliason/FWD K-12 model built at Kitchener, Ontario, Canada. Ahead of it's time, the K-12 was



the snowmobile that gave Polaris Industries at Roseau, Minnesota design principles to consider as they began snowmobile manufacture in 1955.

All of the snowmobiles, though they varied in size and shape, used four-cycle engines, slide track guides, chain link cleated tracks, floating power units and belly pans with running boards that formed the toboggan contour. The wood construction of all the sliding surfaces contacting the snow made the vehicles truly "Motor Toboggans".
