

# HISTORICAL INFO

### AUSTRAILIA'S EMU WAR

In 1932, a group of Australian soldiers and farmers waged what was labeled as a "nuisance wildlife management operation" or an unconventional war against a horde of emus. Public concern over the large flightless birds large numbers, were destroying crops and livestock in the Wheatbelt of Western Australia.

The Great Emu War, as it was dubbed, was a military failure and a public embarrassment for the Australian government. The soldiers were armed with machine guns and trucks, but they proved to be ineffective against the fast and agile emus, who scattered and regrouped at will. The emus also seemed to have a remarkable ability to survive bullets, as some of them were reported to have taken up to five shots before falling. The soldiers managed to kill only about 250 emus out of an estimated 20,000. The war ended after six weeks, with the emus declared the victors. Emus 1 military 0.



#### THOMAS EDISON'S TATTOO PEN



Thomas Edison is best known for his most influential inventions, but even among his lesser accomplishments we can find a success story — of sorts. Even though it is believed to be the first American electric motorpowered device, the electric pen is certainly not the first Edison invention that comes to mind.

Developed in 1875, it was patented in the following year. At 50 punctures per second Edison's "pen" was meant to create a stencil that would allow multiple copies to be made by making a pass over the stencil with an inked roller, thereby transferring the text to a sheet of paper below. Given its anonymity today, it's not surprising that the contraption was largely a flop.

But this is where the story takes a rather unexpected turn. Despite its dis-

mal performance as a writing implement, the technology behind Edison's electric pen left a legacy in one of the more colorful areas of popular culture. In 1891, a New York tattoo artist by the name of Samuel F. O'Reilly produced an electric tattoo needle based on Edison's pen. It brought the twin advantages of speed and precision to what had previously been done at a much slower pace by hand, an advancement that would revolutionize tattooing.

A curious aside is that by the 1890s, tattooing was a popular practice amongst European nobility (influenced most certainly by the practice's use amongst sailors) had begun to have comparable effects among blue bloods across the Atlantic. Being one of the foremost in his field, "Professor" O'Reilly as he called himself, tattooed many of these "society people" himself. However, discretion prevailed, and their names typically remained a secret unless leaked elsewhere.

New York Historical Society—Museum & LIbrary

During Hurricane Andrew in 1992, animal caretakers at Zoo Miami (then Miami Metrozoo) sheltered dozens of flamingos in a bathroom.

Ron Magill, the zoo's goodwill ambassador and communications director took this iconic photo. Magill said there were a total of 38 flamingos in the flock at the time, and they would have all been put in the ladies public restroom as part of the hurricane protocol.

Hurricane Andrew was a category 5 storm and hit the Bahamas, Florida and Louisiana in August 1992, causing \$28.5 billion in damage.


# Who says men don't remember!
