THE 12 DAYS OF CHRISTMAS WINE CONTEST!

Ten months and counting! These groups are still finding ways to reach out and continue with their club groups:


BOOK CLUB (Cheryl Blair): Currently reading "On Hitler's Mountain" by Irmgard A. Hunt

Growing up in the beautiful mountains of Berchtesgaden -- just steps from Adolf Hitler's alpine retreat -- Irmgard Hunt had a seemingly happy, simple childhood. In her powerful, illuminating, and sometimes frightening memoir, Hunt recounts a youth lived under an evil but persuasive leader. As she grew older, the harsh reality of war -- and a few brave adults who opposed the Nazi regime -- aroused in her skepticism of National Socialist ideology and the Nazi propaganda she was taught to believe in.

In May 1945, an eleven-year-old Hunt watched American troops occupy Hitler's mountain retreat, signaling the end of the Nazi dictatorship and World War II. As the Nazi crimes began to be accounted for, many Germans tried to deny the truth of what had occurred; Hunt, in contrast, was determined to know and face the facts of her country's criminal past.

On Hitler's Mountain is more than a memoir – it is a portrait of a nation that lost its moral compass. It is a provocative story of a family and a community in a period and location in history that, though it is fast becoming remote to us, has important resonance for our own time.



Santa's Village—65 years and going strong!

In the early 1950s the building of Highway 11 around downtown Bracebridge caused concern for the locals to find a way to pull people off the bypass and bring business and employment into their town not only during the tourist season but beyond.

Bracebridge's location along the 45th parallel—halfway between the Equator and North Pole—inspired the idea for a Christmas-themed attraction. What better than a Santa's Village. So in 1955, a 6 year old's dream was built.

A theme park, complete with a series of log cabins surrounded by paths filled with characters from nursery rhymes and fairy tales, played mostly by local high school students. A carousel, purchased from Eaton's department store. An outdoor theatre to present classic children's stories and folk tales. Rides and boat trips to the Elves Island play ground (added in the 70's). Santa was provided with a home and workshop, where elves would carry on their work amid, as an early ad put it, "18 acres of enchanted evergreen forest." It was largely a local project, with 95 percent of the initial 160 shareholders residing in Muskoka.

For the past 65 years, Santa's Village in Bracebridge has thrived (even after the opening of Canada's Wonderland). In 2005 the park welcomed it's 5 millionth visitor not including the many dignitaries who have visited since it's creation.

Today, Santa's Village still consists of the core park, campgrounds, Sportsland (which offers activities ranging from go-karts to mini golf), and Muskoka Zip Lines and Aerial Park. While new attractions are continually added, Santa remains at the heart of the park's appeal, spreading the spirit of the holidays throughout the sunnier parts of the year.

Sadly, John McTavish, the man known as Santa at Santa's Village, passed away this past October. Adored by thousands of children over the years, his enduring legacy will never be forgotten.


