This year only 10 PROBUS members were present for the ceremony and unfortunately no lunch after.





# KEVIN DONOVAN THE BILLIONAIRE MURDERS THE MYSTERIOUS DEATHS OF BARRY AND HONEY SHERMAN

### The Murders of Barry and Honey Sherman

Kevin Donovan is a 36 year veteran reporter at the Toronto Star and a published author. In his career, he also covered the Gulf War, in 1991, and Afghanistan, in 2001.

He is the recipient of many awards, including three National Newspaper Awards and two Governor General's Michener Awards.

As the lead investigative reporter for the Star, Kevin shared his insight with us on the unsolved December 2017 murders of Barry and Honey Sherman. His presentation revealed a story of mistakes made in the investigation that left more questions than answers. In the question and answer period Kevin answered according to his findings but no fingers were directly pointed or any big hints revealed. After all it is an ongoing investigation. I guess we will have to read his book, The Billionaire Murders get more details.




### MAY SPEAKER... Professor Paul Delaney, The Heavens Above

### MOOSES' Creamy Garlic Shrimp (or Chicken Linguine) (2 servings)

### Ingredients

1/4 lb uncooked linguine

- 2 tablespoons butter
- 4 tablespoons white wine (more is optional depending on your taste)
- 3 teaspoons grated Parmesan cheese (freshly grated or container)
- 3 cloves of garlic, minced (more or less depending on your taste for garlic)
- 2 teaspoons chopped fresh parsley (either curly or flat) is optional
- 1 pinch salt and pepper to taste
- ½ pound medium shrimp, peeled and deveined (we use cooked shrimps. If you are using chicken you would want to cook your cubed chicken ahead of starting this recipe)

Baby spinach is optional and whatever amount you would like

flour/chicken broth/cream additional Parmesan cheese to sprinkle on top

#### **Directions**

- Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil. Add pasta and cook for 8 to 10 minutes or until al dente; drain
- In a medium saucepan, melt butter over medium low heat; add wine, cheese, garlic, parsley and salt and pepper to taste. Then add your thickener
- Increase heat to medium high and add shrimp (or chicken cubes) to saucepan; cook for 3 to 4 minutes or until shrimp begins to turn pink. Do not overcook your shrimp. If you are adding the spinach to your recipe, add it now to cook.
- Divide pasta into portions and spoon sauce on top; garnish with Parmesan cheese and fresh parsley, if desired

### Meet Claire Barrey-Junop and her riding partner, Dream

Claire has always loved horses. As a child, she watched TV shows, (like Zoro) and read many books about horses.

Claire's first opportunity to take riding lessons came when her military father was stationed in Yorkshire, England. While there she spent many happy times getting acquainted with horses and riding the English pastures. Unfortunately, that was only for 1-1/2 years and the family once again



picked up and transferred to another base. Horseback riding was put on the shelf when school, university, teaching and raising children (life in general) took precedence.

It was much later (about 15 years ago) that Claire and her sister, Janet Fobert, started riding again and she has been loving every moment.

Claire is now riding Dream, a 14 year old beautiful Appaloosa, at The Meadows Equine Facility where she co-partners

the lesson costs, care and boarding expenses with the facility.

Riders provide their personal riding equipment including helmet, boots, riding pants, half-chaps and the brushes to comb their mount. Saddle, bridle and blankets are available at the stable and are specific to each horse.

Claire's riding day with Dream usually starts by getting Dream "tacked up" (bridled and saddled) and lessons with their trainer, Nancy Allen. This is where they practice the skills for small jumps and the technical movements of dressage.

After lessons comes treats for Dream and a rubdown. Claire will often spend more time bonding with Dream by walking her on a long lead so she can graze. On hot days, Dream relishes a good cooling bath with the hose.

Unfortunately, COVID has changed the riding routines. Staff now saddle and curry the horses after lessons and jumping is not permitted but, because Claire pays partboard she can still continue her lessons even though the frequency has been limited.

Such a beautiful bond between horse and rider as witnessed in these pictures. It is wonderful that Claire has been able to fulfill her childhood dream and she declares she will ride for many more years to come!

### "Why note go dog sledding this winter!"

An experience Dale and I, Patricia and John (our hosts), can now check off our bucket list and definitely with no regrets.

We had a mild sunny day on February 26th and made many furry friends in our 2-1/2 hour ride. The dogs are strong, excited and eager to run . Above the crazed cacophony of barks and howls our guide explained the three major rules of dog sledding:

- Dogs love to run but the commands are just semantics to them. "Hike up" and shake the sleigh is to go and stopping is a lot of yelling "whoa" and stomping on a foot brake. (At this point panic was setting in because I was the front brake person.)
- 2. Dogs poop when they run. Who knew! So if we saw a dog squatting we had to yell "POOP" and everyone has to stop and wait till the dog is done (and you know if one goes, others do too). This happens many times. Thank heavens there is no pooper scooping.
- These dogs can run for a long time but they do need short rests. Oh yes and they need help getting up hills.
   Dale, being on the back, got a great work-out and sometimes encouragement from the dogs to push a little harder.
- Dogs run corners the way they want to so it is up to the musher to lean enough to make the sleigh turn. I only dumped Dale once. Proud of that.

After the first few minutes of the mad rush start, our ride became very relaxing where all you heard were the swishing of the runners beneath your feet, the panting dogs running (and Dale when pushing up hill) and the quiet beauty of our winter surroundings.

Our reward for being good mushers was to enjoy a "meet and greet" with the female dogs in the kennel. ### The History of APRONS

The principle use of Mom's or Grandma's apron was to protect the dress underneath because she only had a few. It was also because it was easier to wash aprons than dresses and aprons used less material. But along with that, it served as a potholder for removing hot pans from the oven.

It was wonderful for drying children's tears, and on occasion was even used for cleaning out dirty ears.

From the chicken coop, the apron was used for carrying eggs, fussy chicks, and sometimes half-hatched eggs to be finished in the warming oven.

When company came, those aprons were ideal hiding places for shy kids..

And when the weather was cold, she wrapped it around her arms.

Those big old aprons wiped many a perspiring brow, bent over the hot wood stove.

Chips and kindling wood were brought into the kitchen in that apron.

From the garden, it carried all sorts of vegetables. After the peas had been shelled, it carried out the hulls.

In the fall, the apron was used to bring in apples that had fallen from the trees.

When unexpected company drove up the road, it was surprising how much furniture that old apron could dust in a matter of seconds.

When dinner was ready, she walked out onto the porch, waved her apron, and the men folk knew it was time to come in from the fields to dinner.

It will be a long time before someone invents something that will replace that 'old-time apron' that served so many purposes.



A very windy 17C degree day and the lake is starting to thaw and the ice is shifting and piling on shore. Not much time left for the ice fishermen but they are stubbornly out there.
