annual event, maybe Amy can "surgically" enhance it for more winner names.





Meet Australia's oldest man, 110-years-old, Alfred "Alfie" Date, who is most well-known and admired for knitting pint-sized sweaters for penguins in need.

In the past, wildlife organizations, like Penguin Foundation have asked the public for assistance in knitting sweaters, or "jumpers," for penguins affected by oil spills to wear temporarily. Knitted sweaters are placed on the birds to act as a barrier to keep them from reaching their oily feathers with beaks until rescue staff can wash them clean.

"When little penguins become oiled, they will try to preen and clean the toxic oil from their feathers, and ingesting it can kill them," wrote the Penguin Foundation. "It also damages their delicate feathers, which exposes their skin to extreme temperatures and they are left cold, heavy, and unable to swim or hunt for food."

News of Alfie Date's history of knitting contributions to the Penguin Foundation's "little penguins" first went viral in 2015 and again in 2022. His story has since been shared on the internet 101,000 times.



The book for September is "A Gentleman in Moscow" by Amor Towles

A Gentleman in Moscow immerses us in another elegantly drawn era with the story of Count Alexander Rostov. When, in 1922, he is deemed an unrepentant aristocrat by a Bolshevik tribunal, the count is sentenced to house arrest in the Metropol, a grand hotel across the street from the Kremlin. Rostov, an indomitable man of erudition and wit, has never worked a day in his life, and must now live in an attic room while some of the most tumultuous decades in Russian history are unfolding outside the hotel's



doors. Unexpectedly, his reduced circumstances provide him a doorway into a much larger world of emotional discovery.

Brimming with humour, a glittering cast of characters, and one beautifully rendered scene after another, this singular novel casts a spell as it relates the count's endeavour to gain a deeper understanding of what it means to be a man of purpose.



Helen Hulick, The Woman Who Was Jailed For Wearing Pants To Court

In November 1938, Helen Hulick, a 28-year-old kindergarten teacher, who moved to California from Pennsylvania to teach at a school for the deaf became the subject of a historic fight for women's rights.

On November 9, Hulick was called to testify as a witness to a burglary two men in her building committed. When she took the stand, Judge Arthur S. Guerin reprimanded her for wearing slacks. He said that Hulick's pants, which weren't popular with women at the time, took too much attention away from the legal issues at hand.

To Hulick's surprise, the judge rescheduled the proceedings for her to return dressed in a more "acceptable outfit." To the judge's surprise, however, Hulick publicly denounced this decision the following day.

"You tell the judge I will stand on my rights," she told The Los Angeles Times. "If he orders me to change into a dress, I won't do it. I like slacks. They're comfortable."

Her return to court on November 14 caused even more of a stir. Dressed in an orange shirt and dark green pants, Judge Guerin once again halted the proceedings as soon as Helen Hulick was about to be sworn in.

"The last time you were in this court dressed as you are now and reclining on your neck on the back of your chair, you drew more attention from spectators, prisoners and court attaches than the legal business at hand," he said. "You were requested to return in garb acceptable to courtroom procedure."

The judge expounded on her purported defiance of orderly conduct, and once again ordered her to vacate the premises. Once more, the hearing was rescheduled, and this time, it came with a warning: return in slacks again and face jail time.

Reporters rushed to get a statement from Helen Hulick as soon as she left the courthouse.

"Listen, I've worn slacks since I was 15," she said. "I don't own a dress except a formal. If he wants me to appear in a formal gown that's okay with me. I'll come back in slacks and if he puts me in jail, I hope it will help to free women forever of anti of auditory-verbal therapy and founded her own non-profit. -slackism."

Sure enough, Hulick returned to court the next day wearing pants. Judge Guerin was just as principled, however, and held the kindergarten teacher in contempt of court. Hulick was sentenced to five days in jail on November 15 and was forced to wear a dress (made from denim) for the duration of her prison sentence.



elen's second court appearance on November 14th.

Hulick was released early, and her case sent to the Appellate Court. It overturned Judge Guerin's original ruling four days later, leaving Hulick free to wear whatever she liked at the next hearing. On Jan. 17, 1939, she arrived at the courthouse in a formal evening dress.



Ultimately, Helen Hulick's refusal to wear a dress in court paled in comparison to her career. She became a renowned figure in auditory-verbal therapy and pioneered a new form Judge Guerin, meanwhile, died in 1962 — and is remembered as a hurdle to gender equality.

"Hello Darkness My Old Friend"

"Hello darkness, my old friend..." Everybody knows the iconic Paul Simon & Art Garfunkel song.

This is the amazing story behind the first line of The Sounds of to my friend." Silence. Sandy graduat

It began when Arthur "Art" Garfunkel, a Jewish kid from Queens, enrolled in Columbia University. During freshman orientation, Art met a student from Buffalo named Sandy Greenberg, and they immediately bonded over their shared passion for literature and music. Art and Sandy became roommates and best friends. With the idealism of youth, they promised to be there for each other no matter what. Soon after starting college, Sandy was struck by tragedy. His vision became blurry and although doctors diagnosed it as temporary conjunctivitis, the problem grew worse. Finally after seeing a specialist, Sandy received the devastating news that severe glaucoma was destroying his optic nerves. The young man with such a bright future would soon be completely blind.

Sandy was devastated and fell into a deep depression. He gave up his dream of becoming a lawyer and moved back to Buffalo, where he worried about being a burden to his financially struggling family. Consumed with shame and fear, Sandy cut off contact with his old friends, refusing to answer letters or return phone calls.

Then suddenly, to Sandy's shock, his buddy Art showed up at the front door.

Art was not going to allow his best friend to give up on life, so he bought a ticket and flew up to Buffalo unannounced. Art convinced Sandy to give college another try and promised that he would be right by his side to make sure he didn't fall - literally or figuratively. Art kept his promise, faithfully escorting Sandy around campus and effectively serving as his eyes. It was important to Art that even though Sandy had been plunged into a world of darkness, he should never feel alone. Art started calling himself "Darkness" to demonstrate his empathy with his friend. He'd say things like, "Darkness is going to read to you now." Art organized his life around helping Sandy.

One day, Art was guiding Sandy through crowded Grand Central Station when he suddenly said he had to go and left his friend alone and petrified. Sandy stumbled, bumped into people, and fell, cutting a gash in his shin. After a couple of hellish hours, Sandy finally got on the right subway train. After exiting the station at 116th street, Sandy bumped into someone who quickly apologized - and Sandy immediately recognized Art's voice!

Turned out his trusty friend had followed him the whole way home, making sure he was safe and giving him the priceless gift of independence. Sandy later said, "That moment was the

spark that caused me to live a completely different life, without fear, without doubt. For that I am tremendously grateful to my friend."

Sandy graduated from Columbia and then earned graduate degrees at Harvard and Oxford. He married his high school sweetheart and became an extremely successful entrepreneur and philanthropist.

While at Oxford, Sandy got a call from Art. This time Art was the one who needed help. He'd formed a folk-rock duo with his high school pal Paul Simon, and they desperately needed \$400 to record their first album. Sandy and his wife Sue had literally \$404 in their bank account, but without hesitation Sandy gave his old friend what he needed.

Art and Paul's first album was not a success, but one of the songs, The Sounds of Silence, became a #1 hit a year later. The opening line echoed the way Sandy always greeted Art. Simon & Garfunkel went on to become one of the most beloved musical acts in history.

The two Columbia graduates, each of whom has added so much to the world in his own way, are still best friends. Art Garfunkel said that when he became friends with Sandy, "my real life emerged. I became a better guy in my own eyes and began to see who I was - somebody who gives to a friend." Sandy describes himself as "the luckiest man in the world."
