The (not so little) green leprechauns were out for the PROBUS March meeting eager to launch St. Patrick's Day off to a good start. Although some more than others.








I'm Irish.



WHAT WE HAVE BEEN UP TO



COOKING WITH MOOSE IS BACK!

A fun time on ZOOM cooking with Moose and making his famous wienerschnitzel. Many comments on how delicious this recipe is. Thank you Moose and Pat!



Wienerschnitzel!!!

INGREDIENTS:

2 veal cutlets, one-half inch thick (you can use chicken or pork if you prefer-all cooked the same)

Salt and pepper

Light oil (e.g., Sunflower)

One-half cup flour

One whole medium size beaten egg

One-half cup breadcrumbs

Melted butter and/or lard (a mixture of half and half is ideal) sufficient to cover your frying pan to a depth of one-third to half an inch)

Lemon wedges

Potatoes – we are using small potatoes (whatever amount you want)

Green beans

Slivered almonds if you are doing Green Bean Almandine (whatever amount you want)

DIRECTIONS:

*Gently pound veal cutlets (or chicken or pork) with a meat mallet to make them very thin and flat, about one-quarter inch thick. (Hint: for ease of cleanup, you can place each cutlet between two sheets of plastic wrap or wax paper; if you do not have a meat mallet, you can use a heavy pan or anything flat). Sprinkle the flattened cutlets with salt and pepper, then rub with light oil or apply cook spray.

*Set up 3 shallow dishes, one with flour, one with beaten egg and one with breadcrumbs. Coat each cutlet well first with flour, then egg, then breadcrumbs.

*Heat a sturdy frying pan with butter and/or lard (or the half and half) until melted. Carefully place cutlets in pan. The melted fat must cover the cutlets well. Do not crowd the pan, two at a time, (if you are doing more than 2). Agitate the pan gently as the meat is cooking to ensure that the cutlets do not stick to the bottom. As the cutlets float in the oil, the breadcrumb coating will form a light, puffy crust around the meat and will not retain too much of the cooking fat.

*Cook 3 – 4 minutes over medium heat until the cutlets begin to brown, then turn them over and cook another 1 -2 minutes until both sides are golden brown. Remove from fat and place on a paper towel to drain. Salt the finished cutlets lightly.

Potatoes: Cook your potatoes whatever way you want. You can also do a pasta or a salad to go with your schnitzel. Just remember there is no gravy.

Vegetables: Green Beans Almondine

*Lightly brown slivered almonds in a bit of oil and put to one side in paper towel to soak up the oil (these can be done ahead of time). Cook your green beans the way you like them and then drain, put them in the fry pan, after you have lightly wiped excess oil from the pan, that you browned the slivered almonds.

*Add the slivered almonds and toss with the beans.


Irish Mythology: Na Fianna – An Elite Warrior Guild

Na Fianna, also known as the Fianna Éireann, were a legendary group of warriors in Irish mythology. They were said to be skilled hunters, warriors, and protectors of the high king of Ireland. The Fianna was made up of many battalions called *cathas*, each with 3,000 warriors.

In peaceful times, the main body of the Fianna was made up of three *cathas*, or about 9,000 fighting men, while in times of war this could expand to seven *cathas*, or 21,000 trained, agile, and toughened noble warriors.

The leader of the Fianna was Fionn MacCumhaill, a legendary figure who was said to have acquired great knowledge and wisdom by sucking his thumb as a child. Fionn was known for

his bravery and cunning, and his ability to overcome challenges and enemies.



The Fianna were known for their loyalty to their leader, their bravery in battle, and their strong connection to nature. They were said to have had a code of honor that emphasized fairness, generosity, and respect for the land and its creatures. Many stories and legends have been told about the Fianna over the centuries, and they remain an important part of Irish mythology and folklore today.

The piece is located on a roundabout at exit 12 of the M7 for Newbridge South and The Curragh. The artwork was paid for from 'paid parking' in Newbridge.

St. Patricks Day Traditions


How does one celebrate St. Patrick's Day?


Finn's 1st St. Paddys's Day.

Big Willie! Faron Young's Bull Interview from Country Music Magazine, March 2023



Willie Nelson was an unknown songwriter when he pitched "Hello Walls" to Faron Young, one of the hottest singers in country music. Faron recorded the song in 1961, and it stayed at number one on the Billboard country music charts for nine weeks.

Faron later explained in a radio interview that artists get paid sooner than writers do. When he had already received \$38,000 for the song, Willie was still broke.

Willie asked Faron for a loan, and promised to sell him the song's royalty rights. Faron gave Willie five \$100 bills, and "made him swear on a stack of Bibles he wouldn't sell that song."

Willie said in his autobiography, "When I got my first royalty check of \$3000, I ran to Tootsie's and found Faron sitting drinking at a table and kissed him flush on the mouth I was so excited."

Faron had a more colorful description of this incident in a Nashville tavern: "I was down at Tootsies watering trough, having a bottle of grape juice. I felt this hairy arm go around my neck, and Willie pinched my jaw and pulled me back and French kissed me. It was probably one of the best kisses I ever had."

Willie tried to repay the \$500 then, but Faron responded, "I don't want your money, son. Wait till you can afford it and then fatten a steer for me or something."

According to Willie, "It took years, but I finally paid Faron back by giving him a prize bull my son Billy bought at a livestock auction for \$38,000."

In November 1984, Willie had the bull delivered to Faron's office on Nashville's Music Row. A newspaper quoted Faron as saying, "I could have killed him. I didn't have any place to put a bull like that."

Faron called friend and Grand Ole Opry performer, Jimmy C. Newman, who raised cattle on a farm fifty miles from Nashville.

Jimmy C. agreed to take the bull, but was unprepared for what arrived: "There in the trailer was the biggest bull I'd ever sæn in my life. It was three years old, a registered Simmental bull. I said, 'What in the world have I gotten into?'

"The bull weighed around 3000 pounds. Willie Nelson gave him to us, so I called him Big Willie."

Faron gave half-ownership to the Newmans and wanted to use the bull for breeding.

But that would include showing its registered offspring, and Jimmy C. wasn't equipped for that. He said, "We didn't have registered Simmental cattle. The only cattle I had were crossbred."

Big Willie became an item in Faron's 1986 divorce. A special master inventoried the property of both Faron and Hilda, and included as one of Faron's assets half-interest in a Simmental bull valued at \$10,000.


Faron's lawyer filed an objection, saying the bull was a gift from a personal friend and not a marital asset.

Hilda's lawyer responded with, "This is a marital asset as the defendant had loaned Willie Nelson money years before from marital assets and this animal was in repayment of this debt." The divorce settlement required Faron to pay Hilda \$2500 for her interest in the bull.

Jimmy C. Newman told me this past February he still has three of Big Willie's offspring. "They're huge. They were some of my best cows. They're getting old."

And what became of Big Willie? Jimmy C. says, "Finally we sold him for what we call grade. I forgot what he brought. I would imagine around \$1500. So that was the end of that."

"Picture of Willie & Jim Stinson - breeder of Big Willie - was given to me by Jim's son-in-law. He told me why they have their hands behind their back. They were enjoying a Coors & because Willie was promoting Lone Star at the time thought it best not to seen with another beer."
