Dear PROBUS Members:

Perhaps you watched *Grease* and listened to Olivia Newton John and John Travolta sing "Summer Nights" (1978). And everyone dreamed of California's perpetual summer and its sandy beaches when listening to The Beach Boys.

Whatever it is that creates your summertime memories – be it sounds, smells, experiences (don't forget to sign up for our Probus events!) - make the most of those times.

Life is too short to miss out on those cherished moments.



The race was the product of a scheme by Charles Vance Millar (1853-1926), a Toronto lawyer, financier, and practical jokof his significant estate to the woman in Toronto who could

produce the most children in the decade following his death.

a vacation home in Jamaica to a group of three men who detested each other (under the condition that they live in the estate together indefinitely), brewery stocks to a group of prominent teetotal Protestant ministers if they participated in its operations and collected its dividends, and jockey club stocks to a group of anti-horse-racing advocates.

Litigation over the validity of the contest was resolved when the Supreme Court of Canada upheld the clause's validity. The Court further held the clause did not encompass children born out of wedlock, or stillborn.

Eleven families competed in the "baby race." Seven of them were disqualified, but eventually Judge William Edward Middleton ruled in favour of four mothers (Annie Katherine Smith, Kathleen Ellen Nagle, Lucy Alice Timleck and Isabel Mary Maclean) who each received \$110,000 for their nine children (\$2.02 million in 2021 dollars). Three of the four had to pay back relief money given to them by the City of Toronto government.

Two of the disqualified candidates, Lillian Kenny and Pauline Mae Clarke, each received \$12,500 out of court in exchange for abandoning pending appeals.

The Canadian 2002 TV movie The Stork Derby, depicted the stories of Lillian Kenny, Pauline Mae Clarke and Grace Bagnato and starred Megan Follows.

The film was based upon Elizabeth Wilton's book Bearing The er, who bequeathed the residue Burden: The Great Toronto Stork Derby 1926–1938. In February 2019, the radio program *This American* Life covered the story in some detail.

> In 2016, Toronto's Muddy York Brewing Company produced a Stork Derby Stout as a nod to the unusual event.

It is one of many unusual bequests in his will, along with giving The 2023 novel Prize Women by Caroline Lea is a fictionalized account of the Stork Derby and includes several real-life figures as characters.



Mrs. Darrigo claimed to have had nine children since Oct. 31, 1926. This would have placed her among the leading entries in the derby.



Mrs. Arthur Hollis Timleck claimed to have given birth to nine children in a ten-year period in a bid to win Charles Millar's fortune.

Roland the Farter

Roland the Farter, also known as Roland le Fartere or Roland le Petour, was a medieval entertainer who achieved an unusual degree of fame during his time. He lived during the reign of King Henry II of England in the 12th century and is remembered for his unique and somewhat bizarre talent.

Roland was a minstrel and jester by profession, employed by the court of King Henry II. He was renowned for his exceptional ability to produce impressive and resonant flatulence, which he cleverly incorporated into his performances to entertain the nobles and courtiers.

Roland's artful control over his bodily function allowed him to produce different sounds, tones, and rhythms, turning his flatulence into a form of musical expression. According to historical records, Roland's act involved a ritualized performance known as the "Leap, Split, and Turn."

During this performance, he would execute a graceful leap into the air, while simultaneously executing a controlled split, and finally, he would spin around in a swift motion. At the climax of this acrobatic display, Roland would let out a sonorous and well-timed fart, eliciting laughter and amusement from the audience.

It is important to understand that the medieval court was a place of pageantry and entertainment, where jesters and minstrels were valued for their ability to provide light-hearted amusement. Roland's peculiar talent made him a beloved figure at King Henry II's court, and he was granted various privileges and rewards for his performances. One famous historical




account of Roland's exploits comes from Roger of Hoveden, a chronicler of the time. According to his writings, Roland attended a Christmas celebration at the court in 1052. As part of the festivities, he performed his renowned act in front of the assembled dignitaries and foreign envoys. The story goes that King Henry II was so pleased with Roland's performance that he offered him an unusual reward - a manor house in the village of Hemingstone in Suffolk, England. Along with the estate, Roland was granted a significant parcel of land and various other perks.

Roland's legacy has endured through the centuries, and his tale has been passed down through generations. Today, he is often cited as an example of a historical figure who achieved fame and favor through an unusual and unexpected talent.

Some details of Roland the Farter's life may have been exaggerated or romanticized over time. Nevertheless, his story remains a curious and amusing piece of medieval history, providing us with a glimpse into the peculiarities of entertainment and social dynamics in the past.
