#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear PROBUS Members:

I think I must be getting old. I was sure it was summer last week and yet when I look at the calendar, it's the end of October. Either the clocks have sped up or, my sense of time is diminishing.

Some of our members ended the summer by going on vacations in September and Kent and I were among that number. For us, it was a celebratory trip with friends, and we made the most of it. Doing an ocean cruise, we visited 7 countries (8 if you count a 3-hour layover in Iceland) over the course of 3 weeks seeing and

experiencing a variety of things. As interest has been expressed in this trip, I thought I would give a few highlights of our visits.

First stop: **Oslo**, a beautiful city and a great introduction to the country that became our favourite. The architecture is a mix of old and new, the styles blending cohesively. From the buildings of the Barcode Project to the Opera House rising out of the water like an iceberg, from the art of Munch to the sculptures of Vigeland, the city was amazing.

Leaving Oslo, we boarded a train for an 8-hour, 450 km trip north and west. At **Finste** we were travelling at 1300 metres above sea level, passing glaciers but no trees or roads. We went through the town of **Voss**, where a Christmas tradition is eating sheep's heads. At **Bergen**, we discovered that despite it being the rainiest city in Europe, it has burnt to the ground 40 times.

The countryside around the city has several troll fences that obviously work as we never saw a troll on our visit.

An interesting fact about Norway: the country has made a commitment to decrease its greenhouse gas emissions by 85% by the year 2030 and is well on its way to achieving this goal. *Continued....*

## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE...continued



Most of the transportation is electric. Glass and tin are used instead of plastics and electric bikes and scooters are in use everywhere.

Many permanent accommodations in **Amsterdam** are houseboats and barges. These boats have to be removed from the water every 3 to 4 years for their hulls to be checked and repainted. As well, old cruise ships are being used to house many of the refugees that arrive in the city.

**Bruges** has a 2-mile-long tunnel running **111** feet deep under its cobbled streets and gothic houses. This tunnel connects the 500-year-old De Halve Maan brewery in the heart of Bruges to its bottling plant just outside the city. Enough beer flows every hour to fill **12**,000 bottles.

**Paris** is undergoing massive renovations, especially in tourist areas such as Champs-Elysees, in preparation for next summer's Olympic games. As the opening ceremonies will be held along the Seine River, the green bouquinistes (open-air, second-hand bookstalls) lining the Seine are due to be dismantled and moved for the summer, creating a lot of controversy.

In the 1860's, 4 tunnels were built under **Portsmouth** and **Southwick** to defend the naval base. In World War 2, these tunnels became the communications nerve centre for the planning of D-day, being used as Underground Headquarters for Operation Overlord. Later, they became part of the Royal Navy's NATO communication network, resulting in the Soviet Union classifying them a Category A target during the Cold War.

Winter storms along the coast of Cornwall can be fierce, with waves breaking over the top of clock towers. Dealing with seas such as this may be one reason the **Pendennis** Coast Guard has coordinated rescues as far away as Jamaica.

**Porto**, which was settled in the 4<sup>th</sup> century, is a city of bridges. The Maria Pia Bridge, which was built in 1877, is attributed to Gustave Eiffel who, 10 years later, began his work on the Eiffel Tower. A more recent connection to fame is *Harry Potter*; J. K. Rowling wrote her first novel here.

While Bergen is the rainiest city in Europe, **Malaga** is the sunniest – 320 days of sun per year. The city is home to the bullring *La Malagueta* as well as many Roman ruins, including a theatre dating from the first century, which was discovered behind the Alcazaba fortress (the residence of the Turkish sultan in the 11<sup>th</sup> century) in 1950. Visiting during the Malaga Fashion Week, we saw the longest catwalk in Europe. It is situated outdoors, covered for sun protection, blue carpeted and extends for 300 meters.

**Cartagena** also has a number of Roman ruins but is currently known for the building and repair of NATO submarines. A city where the average monthly income is 1000 euros, the average monthly rent is 800 euros.

As a lot of you are aware from following the news, Europe has been affected by global warming with high temperatures (it was always in the mid-90's when we were there) and drought. In **Barcelona**, the plane trees (sycamores) have lost their bark due to this and consequently all have to be removed and replaced with a variety of other trees. To help combat global warming, it is now mandatory for solar panels to be put on all new or refurbished buildings.

Of special interest to a number of our members: there is a new sport rapidly gaining popularity in Barcelona known as Pickleball!

Back home and over our jet lag, we are once again enjoying socializing with you at the events that our club has been offering. The Probus get-away in Collingwood was a resounding success. We are looking forward to welcoming back Guess Who's Coming to Dinner and Twelve Days of Christmas Wine. In the new year we will have our first Whisky Tasting (is there a theme here?).

sounds are set with a purpose to set the mood of the scene.


#### **Guest Speaker for November... Paul Bassett "Demystifying Artificial Intelligence: What** We Do and Don't Yet Understand"


Knitting group will be meeting on the 4th Thursday of every month.





#### The Pumpkin Regatta—Oh Canada!

Each year in October, people take to the water of Lake Pesaguid in Windsor, Nova Scotia for the famous Windsor Pumpkin Regatta. Let's explore the history of this event! The race was founded in 1999 by Danny Dill. His father, Howard Dill, grew Atlantic Giant Pumpkins. The first race featured only five entries, and it was won by Leo Swinimer of New Ross, Nova Scotia. As it turned out, Leo would dominate the event, winning every single year from 1999 to 2007, while also being in his 70s. The first person to win the race other than Leo was Anthony Cook, who won in 2008. He won again in 2010. By this point, the regatta had grown to 60 entries with 10,000 people coming out to watch. In the regatta, there are three classes of races: Motoring Experimental Paddling The paddling class is by far the most famous. The race runs for 800 metres, and the giant pumpkins must be the sole means of flotation in the race. In 2005, Martha Stewart stated she would participate in the regatta. While she did enter a pastelcoloured pumpkin, she was unable to attend as she didn't have permission to enter Canada after her incarceration yet. Due to low water levels in Lake Pesaquid, which has now dried up, there has not been a full regatta there since 2018. The lake is man-made and was filled with fresh water from the Avon River. In 2019, the event was nearly cancelled due to a poor growing season and a lack of giant pumpkins. It went forward but was much smaller than usual. No pumpkin regatta was held in 2020 or 2021 due to the Covid-19 Pandemic. In 2022, the regatta made its debut on Thanksgiving Weekend in Shelburne Harbour. The event was held as part of the Shelburne County Giant Pumpkin Festival. The event in 2023 was also be held there on Oct. 7.
